### 2. National English Curriculum

ACAL was represented by Cheryl Wiltshire and Jan Hagston at a recent meeting hosted by the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) in Melbourne to discuss the first proposal for the new Senior Years English Curriculum. Four courses are proposed. One of these is *English for Life and the Workplace*. ACAL identified a number of problems with the draft proposal and is arguing that this English course should focus on the user's repertoire of language skills and the application of these in real life, authentic contexts. To achieve this, the curriculum writers will need to have particular skills. Further down the track, to ensure that this course is effectively taught, recruitment and professional development issues will need to be addressed.

The day will start with a keynote panel focusing on recent developments in health literacy.

# 6. New resource - It's easy being green

Adult language literacy and numeracy activities for environmental life skills

This is an engaging resource which builds adult language, literacy and numeracy skills in a purposeful manner in the context of environmental sustainability. It was developed with funding from the Adult Literacy National Project administered by the Commonwealth Department of Education, Employment and Workplace Relations. (DEEWR)

The resource consists of a series of activities around the themes of:

- Water
- Energy
- **Transport**
- Waste and recycling
- Shopping (Consuming)
- Green steps (Carbon footprints)
- Model texts (annotated models of written texts to support activities in the resource)

A limited number of copies (250) have been distributed as a print resource and a CD. Activities can be photocopied directly from the print resource, or downloaded and printed from the CD. The CD contains the same materials as the print resource with the addition of a sound file and set of images. The images can be printed out or projected onto a screen to focus whole group discussion. 7. New resource - Give it a go! Help a literacy learner

A new resource is about to be released to benefit adult literacy across Australia. Give it a go! Help a literacy learner, is a DVD and CD Rom package to assist people who help literacy learners so they can be more effective in their supporting role. The Department of Education, Employment and Workplace Relations (DEEWR) administers the Adult Literacy National Project which funds Innovative Projects in the field of adult literacy. The Adult Basic Education (ABE) section of TAFE NSW- Western Sydney Institute, OTEN secured this funding to develop the resource.

Learning literacy skills as an adult is itself a challenge but even more so for people who cannot attend classes due to various circumstances or living in remote areas. Sometimes they need a little help from family, friends or associates. Via its work with distance literacy students and their helpers, OTEN ABE recognised a real need to provide a relevant package for people who work as supporters of literacy students. *Give it a go! Help a literacy learner* DVD and CD Rom aims to inform and support people as they encourage and help these learners to keep on track and gain skills.
