1. Adult Literacy National Project funding lost

A recent COAG decision has removed adult literacy funding supporting the *Reading Writing Hotline*, the Adult Literacy Innovative Projects, ACAL's *Literacy Live* and *Literacy Link* projects and a range of other activities.

ACAL wrote to the Federal Minster for Education, Julia Gillard, and the Federal Parliamentary Secretary for Social Inclusion, Ursula Stephens, expressing concerns about the loss of funding for the Adult Literacy National Project. We encourage members to write to their state and federal politicians alerting them to the loss of the national funding for adult literacy.

You may have students who phoned the Reading Writing Hotline. Perhaps they would like to write letters to politicians describing the service they had and its effect on their lives.

2. Impact on ACAL and Literacy Link

ACAL produced *Literacy Link* with funding from DEEWR from the Adult Literacy National Project. The national newsletter was distributed free of charge to almost 2000 individuals and organisations. Without Government funding, ACAL can no longer afford to produce Literacy Link. One more free issue will come out around Easter – if our readers want Literacy Link to continue, this will need to be on a subscription basis. Other ACAL activity is also affected by the loss of funding. The *Literacy Live* professional development forums will cease or be drastically reduced.

ACAL will continue to lobby for the interests of literacy teachers and students. ACAL eNews will continue to come out on a regular basis.

A recently released report argues for four ways to take health literacy forward in South Australia: strengthen alliances; strengthen health literacy within the health sector; strengthen health literacy with partners; support research, training and education. The results of the report have implications for the adult literacy field as we seek to understand how the health+literacy equation produces challenges and new opportunities for a range of government agencies and educators.

ACAL Executive members Debbie Soccio and Sue Shore have been working with the Global Campaign for Education (GCE http://www.campaignforeducation.org/) to build numbers for their global readathon during Global Action Week (April 20-26th 2009). During Action Week 2008 GCE attracted close to 9 million people to participate in the 'World's Biggest Lesson'. In 2009 GCE is focusing on Youth, Adult Literacy and Lifelong learning and organising a 'Big Read'. People around the world will participate in reading stories written by remarkable people about how literacy makes a difference in their lives. This is a great opportunity to connect Australian LLN learners students with other learners around the world and give them an opportunity to speak out about how literacy fits (or not) in their lives.
